Workshop 1

- David Torgerson: Design issues in social science trials: David will talk about design issues with respect to social science trials. Cluster trials are more vulnerable to a range of post-randomisation biases, such as recruitment, exclusion and attrition bias compared with individually randomised studies. David will look at threats of these biases and discuss how modifying the design of a trial may allow us to avoid them.
- Martin Bland: Allocation methods: Martin will describe allocation in practice. He will describe ٠ simple and blocked randomisation, the problems of matching, and the advantages and difficulties of stratification. He will describe the minimisation method with an example drawn from a cluster randomised trial.
- Martin Bland: The analysis of trials using cluster allocation: Martin will show the dangers of • ignoring the clusters in the analysis of cluster randomised trials. Some different methods will be used to analyse a trial in education, including both cluster level and individual level analyses. The results will be compared.
- Chad Nye: Assessing Methodological Quality of Randomised and Quasi-Experimental Trials: This session will use an example of a systematic review of RCTs and QEDs in the field of speech/ language pathology to provide a detailed analysis of the methodological quality of experimental and guasi-experimental group designed studies in the area.
- Karen Bloor, Chair, all speakers: Panel discussion: This will be an opportunity to ask speakers • anything about the contents of the day or anything else concerning trials.

Workshop 2 - Advanced meta-analysis (Speakers and programme to be confirmed)
